



"Utopistics"

"The last thing we need are more utopian visions." With this phrase the American intellectual Immanuel Wallerstein opened his conference in 1997 in New Zealand. He proceeded to explain that in many instances throughout history the utopias of some have provoked the infernos of others. Fanatical movements, be they religious or political, oftentimes accompany utopian visions and leave little room for reason, dialogue or thoughtful considerations.


During his speech, Wallerstein coined a new word to suggest a different route toward a better society: utopistics. He defines the term as a "serious evaluation of historical alternatives" and "the exercise of judgment in terms of the material rationality of possible alternate historical systems" in the search for a "better, plausible alternate future". He states that *utopistics* attempts to reconcile what science, morality and politics teach us should be our individual and social objectives.

In his presentation, Wallerstein analyzed the present state of the global capitalist system which has been in existence for over 500 years. He identified some of the contradictions which are part of the system and the role they may play in future developments. He also discussed some of the major changes (better known as "revolutions") that have altered this system during the past centuries.

Although many of the elements presented by Wallerstein in this conference and in the book that he subsequently published on the same topic have been criticized, he does offer some clues for individuals and groups that seriously consider the search for alternatives to our present situation. In the first place, he reminds us of the need for a wide-ranging historical vision. He shares with the historian Braudel and the French school of the Annales the concept of the longue dureé. Instead of limiting considerations to certain figures, groups or movements of a particular era, he advises us to look at the much wider (and much slower) processes of human history if we want to understand the functioning of today's global capitalist system. How many of today's "political analysts" include the discussion of global economic structures, their changes and the implications of these changes when they analyze, for example, Puerto Rico's present economic crisis? They are more likely to limit themselves to today's headlines and criticisms of particular administrators or politicians. An essential service that universities must provide today is that of offering a wide, historic and critical vision, within a global context, of our present situation. At the same time this service needs to reach the man — and woman— "on the street".

According to Wallerstein, "utopistics" also implies the application of science, morality and politics to the formulation of our long-term goals. In the near future, the Piñero Collection will be launching a new initiative using social media to create a modest but important effort to offer a space for dialogue, as well as open and rational discussion of topics of major importance for our society. We hope that this new effort will be an example of "utopistics" in action.
